Year 7 Catch Up Premium Grant 2017-18

The Department for education has previously allocated £500 per pupil for the number of year 7 pupils who did not achieve at least a level 4 in reading and/or mathematics at Key Stage 2. This is based on Key Stage 2 data and the autumn school census. In 2017 to 2018 allocated funding to schools will be based on what they receive for catch-up premium funding in 2016 to 2017, adjusted to reflect the percentage change in the size of their year 7 cohort between the October 2016 and the October 2017 school censuses.

In 2016/17 the allocation of funds for this purpose to Woodlands School was £34,500.

In 2017/18 these monies are being used to fund:

- 1. Boost lessons
- 2. Raising Standards Interventions
- 3. Small group interventions including Sound Training, Stepping Stones
- 4. 1:1 support and intervention with numeracy including Mathletics, Turnabout Programme
- 5. 1:1 support and intervention with Literacy including Accelerated Reader, Spellodrome, Bedrock Vocabulary and Lexia

Impact 2016/17

There are 83 students in Year 7 (2016-17) that receive Catch up Funding and the impacts in terms of literacy and numeracy are closely tracked on a half termly basis to evidence diminishing differences and the progression made by students. In English 70.4% of the pupils eligible for Catch up funding are working at a Level 4 equivalent grade or higher by the end of Year 7 and for maths 43.2% of eligible pupils are now working at a Level 4 equivalent grade or higher.
