School context for PPG pupils

The pupil premium is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and close the gap between them and their peers. The funding is available to both mainstream and non-mainstream schools such as special schools and pupil referral units.

Funding:

In 2018-2019 the school received £935.00 for each child registered and eligible for free school meals at any point in the last 6 years. This amount remains the same from 2017-18.

The school also received £2300.00 for each looked after pupil:

- identified in the January 2019 <u>school census</u> or the <u>alternative provision census</u> as having left local authority care as a result of:
 - adoption
 - · a special guardianship order
 - a child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order)
- who has been in local authority care for 1 day or more
- recorded as both eligible for FSM in the last 6 years and as being looked after (or as having left local authority care.)

Distribution of disadvantaged pupils for the year shows that 43% at Woodlands School were registered as Pupil Premium in 2018/19. Figures show that the percentage of pupils eligible for PPG is decreasing.

In July 2019 according to DfE figures, 39.7% of pupils were eligible for Pupil Premium funding for 2019-20.

"Leaders ensure that the additional government funding is used effectively. Spending is carefully targeted through a clear strategic plan, with effective monitoring and evaluation that holds staff to account. Pupil premium funding is securing further improvements in the progress of disadvantaged pupils, both socially and academically. Academic progress for Year 11 disadvantaged pupils over the last two years has been broadly in line with that of all pupils nationally, while the proportion of disadvantaged pupils encouraged to take part in the school play increased significantly".

Aim of spending: To ensure pupil premium funding is spent in a targeted way, ensuring

pupils receive the opportunity for additional support and

access to all learning opportunities within the school.

Aim of outcome: To further close the gap in achievement of pupils supported by pupil

premium and those who are not eligible for the grant; ensuring high levels of attainment, progress and successful progression onto further

training or education.

Main barriers to learning for PPG pupils demonstrate there is:

- A need to prioritise supporting the academic achievement for many PPG pupils.
- A need to prioritise literacy and reading skills of PPG pupils.
- A need to increase aspirations and post-16 opportunities.
- A need to develop more positive attitudes to school and engagement with learning for PPG pupils.
- A need to provide extra support in terms of uniform, equipment, school trips to ensure full access to all aspects of school life and for all pupils.

These priorities drive the key foci of the spending plan below.
