The story is told from the perspective of two teenage siblings and their experiences with LGBTQ+ and accepting yourself and others for who you and they are. For KS4, I would like to recommend: Everything, Everything by Nicola Yoon. This book tells the story of Madeline, a young lady who is allergic to the world and has to spend her life at home, never being allowed to go out. However, Madeline finds herself falling in love with someone. What will happen?
